Their innovation was a tiddlywinks game fashioned entirely from recycled materials, showcasing their dedication to sustainability. One of the most notable features of their project was the use of recycled bottle caps to create the tiddlywinks, demonstrating creativity and eco-consciousness in equal measure. This unique approach garnered particular attention from judges on the day. The journey to London was an adventure in itself, with students and teachers embarking on a day trip by train. Excitement filled the air as they made their way to the capital city, prepared to present their project to a panel of judges. Throughout the day, students not only pitched their project but also had the chance to participate in various workshops, including 'Create a Zine' and ceramics work. The whole year group spent the day working in teams to complete various tasks designed to emulate the running of a business – from applying for a bank loan from our own Stockport Academy Bank, to purchasing equipment and developing a number of products to go to market.

Students also had to negotiate contracts with retailers in order to sell their products before finally presenting their company to the rest of the cohort, with various prizes awarded at the end of the day in recognition of different achievements.

The most successful company generated over £6,800 in revenue – which was a fantastic result!

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Liverpool Cathedral Visit

Our Year 10 Religious Studies students journeyed to Liverpool to visit both Cathedrals and learn more about what Christian worship is like in practice.


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
